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Commas, Quotation Marks and Apostrophes (For Primary Ages)

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The activities contained in this book allow teachers to meet the requirements of the English curriculum document with regard to the **Writing** strand. The book provides opportunities for the consolidation of language skills that children should be equipped with as a result of their primary schooling.

As shown in the Contents below the approach is basic and simple - teach the skill; reinforce it in a variety of ways; use it in context as often as possible.

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Commas

Commas are used...

1. To separate items in a list, e.g.
 - ★ *It was a cold, frosty day.*
 - ★ *The dog traipsed mud over the kitchen floor, lounge room, rug and onto the bedroom carpet.*
2. To separate a word or words in a sentence, which give further explanation, e.g.
 - ★ *The zoo keeper, who came from Ireland, enjoyed his work here.*
3. To separate a person spoken to from the rest of the sentence, e.g.
 - ★ *John, wait near the door.*
4. To separate parts of an address when used in a sentence, e.g.
 - ★ *Their address is 24 Park Street, West Auckland, New Zealand.*
5. In dates to separate days and dates, e.g.
 - ★ *It is Friday, 27th July, 1995.*
6. After the greeting and the conclusion of a letter, e.g.
 - ★ *Dear Sam,*
.....
.....
Your friend,
Joe.
7. To separate clauses, e.g.
 - ★ *When the last people arrive, we can all go inside.*
8. After 'yes' or 'no', e.g.
 - ★ *No, it is not allowed!*
9. After signal words at the beginning of a sentence, e.g.
 - ★ *Therefore, we shall have to leave early.*
10. In direct speech, at the end of a quotation which is a statement, e.g.
 - ★ *"I saw him yesterday," Gail said.*

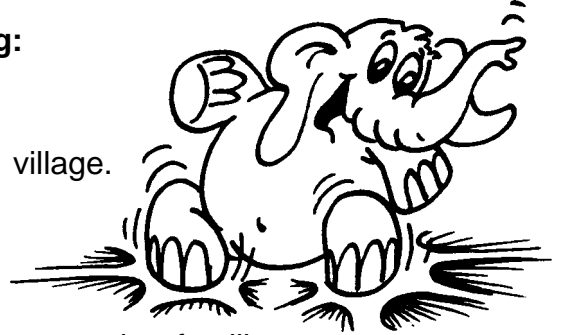


Commas (1) - using commas in lists

Commas are used to separate items in a list (if 'and' or 'or' are used, no comma is needed).

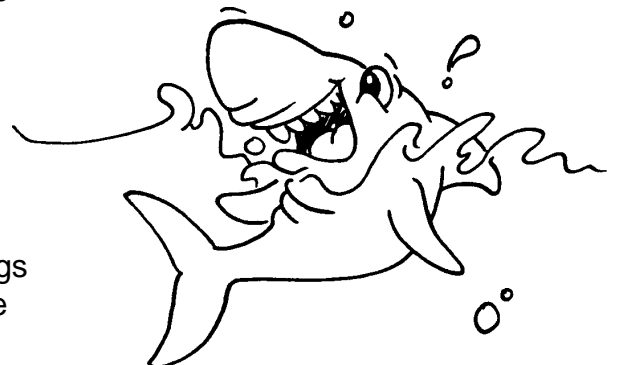
Insert commas in the correct places in the following:

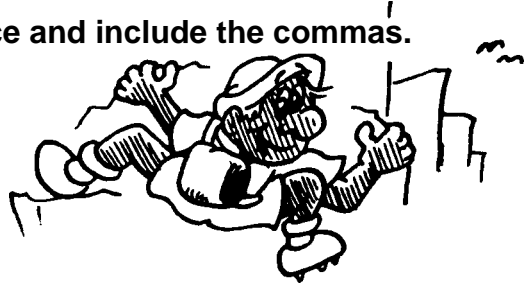

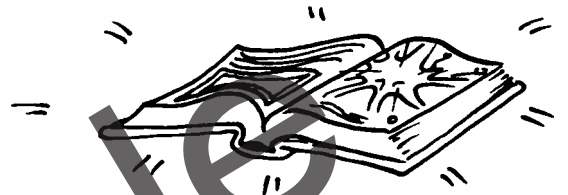
Commas (2) - using commas in lists

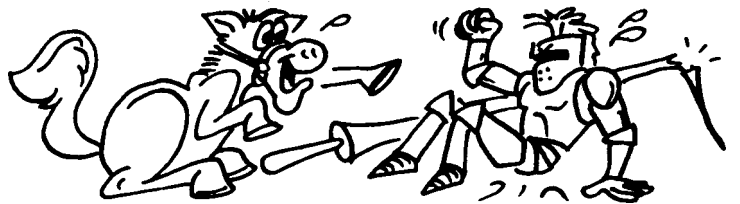

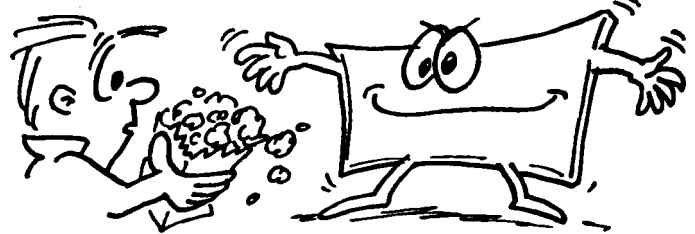
Commas (3) - separating items in a list

Football is televised.



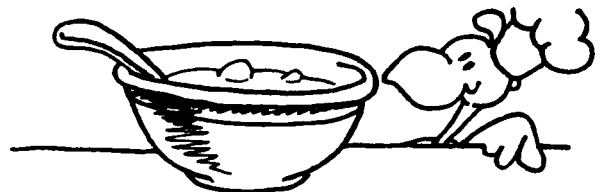
