With an ever-increasing awareness of and exposure to environmental concerns, junior primary students may feel a sense of helplessness or even fear, regarding the future of the earth. **Porter P. Bear The Earth Detective** aims to empower students by informing them of the impact of humans on the environment, and promoting both active and informed citizenship based on this understanding.

With the view that knowledge of an issue is a precursor to action, the book promotes environmentally responsible decision making through an understanding of the interdependence and importance of the global community in addressing environmental concerns.

How to use this Activity Book

This book should be used in conjunction with the associated resource book, **Porter P. Bear The Earth Detective.**

The sections of this book can be used both independently or collaboratively within the classroom. Once a section of the story book has been read, the related activity pages presented in this book can be completed.

Environmental themes covered include:

- The Arctic
- Energy

- Fossil Fuels
- Deforestation
- Pollution
- The Ozone Layer
- New Kinds of Energy

The polar bear character of Porter allows students a more tangible backdrop to their exploration than a fact-based series of information. Porter's trials may illicit an emotional response from the reader, engaging their interest and underpinning their understanding of the environmental concerns facing the earth.

About the Activities

The activities in this book are SOSE/ HSIE/S&E and Science based and build upon the ideas and information presented in the resource book.

Most activity sheets are directly related to a section of the story book, enabling teachers to use the text as the foundation for the extension of skills and understandings.

Internet activities (Click On It) and Earth detective extension activities encourage further learning through Internet based games and independent research, as well as interactions between the students themselves and the people in their community.



- 11, Is a Chinese symbol of luck.





Porter P. Bear would like to go back home to the Arctic.




